(B) STUDENT DEVELOPMENT MATTERS

1 Student Welfare

- 1.1 Students are encouraged to approach their Form Teachers and/or subject teachers if they face any challenges, be it in school or at home.
- 1.2 Students who are Singapore citizens requiring financial support can collect the Financial Assistance Scheme (FAS) form from the General Office. Non-Singaporean students can approach their Form Teachers to request for financial support.
- 1.3 The school has a team of personnel in place to support all students. Students can approach these staff for advice if they need a listening ear, eg, for stress, relationship issues with peers or family, bullying, cyber addictions in gaming, social media, time management or financial needs.
 - Mr Lewis Lam and Ms Lim Soo Ling (School Counsellors) support mental, social and emotional well-being
 - Ms Menaga (SEN Officer) supports students with special educational needs
 - Ms Suma Haridas (ECG Counsellor) advises on educational and career matters
 - Mr Bernard Cheong (Student Welfare Education Officer) advises on motivation and attendance issues.

2 Student Management

- 2.1 We encourage all parents/guardians to work with the school to ensure that your child abides by the School Rules found in the Student Diary 2024. Please remind your child/ward that attendance and punctuality for school/lessons/CCAs are important values. Any student who is unwell and unable to attend school is required to obtain a medical certificate from a registered doctor to validate his/her absence from school. Student should submit the medical certificate to the Form Teacher the following school day as part of responsible behaviour.
- 2.2 All handphones are to be switched off and kept in the lockers in the morning. You can call the General Office at 6746 6503 if you need to contact your child/ward for urgent matters.
- 2.3 All GEMS are expected to maintain good behaviour at all times and especially when they are in school uniform. The school focuses on nurturing good character development and habits, including using time prudently after school. Do encourage your child not to loiter outside and misbehave.

3 Safety & Security and Traffic Advisory

- 3.1 The school places great emphasis on the safety and security of students and staff. To prepare our community for emergencies, the school will conduct regular emergency preparedness drills throughout the year. In Term 1, students will be briefed and participate in an emergency training drill.

8 National Digital Literacy Programme (NDLP) and the PLD Initiative

NDLP was launched in 2020 to make digital learning inclusive by equipping students with digital skills to be future-ready. Every secondary school student will own a school-prescribed personal learning device (PLD) and they may use funds from their Edusave Account to pay for it. The use of the PLD for teaching and learning will:

- support the development of digital literacy in our students
- support self-directed and collaborative learning and
- enhance teaching and learning

For Sec 1: The school has chosen the Chromebook (Lenovo 500e Gen 4) as the students' PLD. This will come with a 3-year insurance and warranty and cost about \$539 (w/o GST). Students can tap on their Edusave to pay for the PLD. More information on the procurement will be provided soon. For Sec 2-5 students: They are reminded to use their PLDs responsibly. A fully charged PLD should be brought to school daily so that optimal learning can take place. As the PLD is bundled with a 3-year insurance and warranty, students should report any loss/damage/defects immediately using the ICT Helpline (https://go.gov.sg/ict-helpline).

9 MOE's Sexuality Education

(E) CURRICULUM MATTERS

1 English Language and Literature

The English Reading Programme aims to nurture a love for reading in our students. Consistent reading enhances language proficiency and empowers students to excel in subjects requiring broad content knowledge and strong language skills. Students will subscribe to educational magazines such as iThink, Inspire, iMag, and iKnowledge. These materials from established publishers complement classroom lessons by helping students expand their general knowledge, cultivate their critical thinking skills and enrich their perspectives on the world.

Secondary 1 Literature Alternative Assessment: Students will be embarking on a Literature project for their Common Test 1. The deadline for submission is Term 1 Week 5. More details will be provided by the respective subject teachers.

2 Mother Tongues (MT)

All students offering Tamil Language will have to register for their classes with Umar Pulavar Language Centre and inform Mdm Li Ping (SH MT)/Mr Neo Ping Leng (HOD MT) of their lesson timing.

Students taking a 3rd language, those posted to MSP and CSP Zonal Centres will have to refer to the respective school website for instructions on registration. Students posted to MOE Language Centres (Bishan and Newton) will also need to complete the registration via the website at moelc.moe.edu.sg. Students are expected to attend lessons regularly at these centres.

For students exempted from MT, they will report to a designated venue in school during curriculum time for self-revision.

3 Mathematics

Sec 1-3 students will have the opportunity to apply the concepts learnt in real-life applications in sustainability-related topics. This alternative assessment will count towards the marks for Common Test 1 and provide students with a platform to collaborate and harness technology in the learning of Mathematics within and beyond the classroom. For selected students, they will subscribe to an interactive IT-learning platform that complements Home-Based Learning lessons to develop greater self-directedness in them. More details will be provided by the respective subject teachers.

4 Science

The school's Applied Learning Programme (ALP) in Science adopts a contextualized approach for its curriculum design, exploring a common theme on Sustainability, with unique programmes for each level. It adopts a blended approach where Tier 1 ALP for all lower secondary students, is infused into the curriculum for 10 weeks. Tier 1 programme exposes students to basic science principles and the use of instrumentation in fieldwork and mini-projects. Sec 1 embarks on Urban Heat Island and Sec 2 on Urban Agriculture. These programmes are conducted by the subject teachers in the science laboratory and greenhouse, in collaboration with our industry partner, Comcrop Pte Ltd. Tier 2 ALP is targeted at Sec 3 students who are passionate in the subject and wish to pursue sustainability further. Tier 2 programmes are conducted throughout the year and students are provided with the opportunity to work on projects related to Environmental Science and Sustainability.

5 Humanities

The Humanities Inquiry Approach is adopted for all 3 Humanities - Geography, History and Social Studies. It establishes a common understanding of how Inquiry-based learning (IBL) can take place. IBL promotes student-centred and collaborative learning as it creates opportunities for students to take ownership of their learning rather than passively receiving information. Students work in pairs/teams to support each other and this helps to develop students' critical and reasoning skills, knowledge construction and deepen learning, which are all critical skills in the 21st Century. IBL also ties in aptly with our school's vision to develop our students to become Passionate Learners, Courageous Leaders, Caring Citizens.

Alternative Assessment: As part of IBL and in developing 21st Century Competencies in students, alternative assessments will be used to gauge students' learning and mastery of concepts and skills in the following Humanities Subjects: Sec 1 Geography and History, Sec 3 Core Geography and Geography Elective. More details will be shared by the respective subject teachers and the grades obtained will constitute grades for Common Test 1 in Term 1.

In addition to the above, various investigations for the 3 subjects will also take place from Term 2 to Term 3. These details will be shared from the middle of Term 1. Grades obtained from these investigations will be used for Common Test 3 in Term 3.

Geographical Investigation for Sec 1 - Sec 3:

Sec 1 G2/G3	Water: Through this inquiry process, students will understand Singapore's vulnerability due to its limited water supply and appreciate the ingenuity taken by various stakeholders (both public and private) to manage this resource in a sustainable way to improve our water security.		
Sec 2 Exp/N(A)	Housing and transport: Through this inquiry process, students will better appreciate the uniqueness of the neighbourhood, the transportation system and public housing scheme, and how these are thoughtfully planned to cater to the diverse needs of the population in an inclusive and sustainable manner.		
Sec 3 Exp/N(A) Elective Geography & Core Geography	Sense of Place and sustainability in our neighbourhood: Students will explore their respective neighbourhoods to determine how sustainable their area is. They will use various data collection and representation methods to test the validity of their hypothesis statement and link their research topics to the Singapore Green Plan 2030 to address sustainability.		

Historical Investigation for Sec 1 and 2: Students will investigate a historical Issue, identify, compare, analyse, and explore multiple sources and perspectives to arrive at some historical interpretations.

Sec 1 (G2/G3)	Experiences and contributions of early migrants in Singapore: Students will understand and appreciate the life and experiences of the early migrants, their struggles as well as their contributions which continue to impact Singapore today.			
Sec 2 Exp/N(A)	Significant events in Singapore in the 1950s-1960s and how they shape they impact the political, economic and social development aspects, as well as Singapore's road to independence.			

Issues Investigation for Sec 3 Social Studies: Students will embark on a project in Term 2 to investigate societal issues on Sustainability, the various approaches Singapore has undertaken to safeguard sustainability, and their impacts. They will also suggest ways in which individuals like themselves can make a difference, alongside government and non-government efforts. The investigation will help students understand better what it means to be an informed, concerned and participative citizen in a world facing resource depletion and global warming.

Sec 3 Speakers Series Programme: These are talks organised to engage speakers from various segments of society. This helps students to better understand and appreciate how the concepts and issues in the Upper Secondary Social Studies syllabus relate to real life and how they can play a part in contributing to society. The first session will be held on 1 Feb and the second session on 21 Mar.

Sec 1 National Education Learning Journey on 8 Mar: This programme is organized to engage students in an inquiry on Singapore's early history. This would help them better appreciate how Singapore was like in the past, the life and experiences of early migrants, their struggles and contributions. Acquiring knowledge of the interconnections between local, regional and global developments allows students to understand the impact of external forces on domestic developments, and how individuals can contribute to the community, nation and world. Such an appreciation encourages students to reflect on their identity, and at the same time take active roles in improving the lives of others.

6 Food & Consumer Education (FCE), Design and Technology (D&T) and Art

These are examinable Common Curriculum subjects at Lower Secondary. These subjects give students more opportunities to interact and learn with classmates of different strengths and interests. Teachers adopt a range of teaching approaches to meet the different learning needs and pace of their students in the class. Lessons conducted in the Food Laboratory, Design Studios and Art Rooms involve hands-on sessions where students have to abide by safety rules. Our subject teachers will brief students on these rules when they start working in these special rooms.

Sec 2 FCE: In-house culinary sessions will be conducted once a term to provide opportunities for students to discover their interest and hone their culinary skills. These hands-on sessions will enhance their competencies in food preparation and promote greater joy of learning. Due to limited space in the Food Laboratory, only 16 places are available per session. More details will be provided nearer the date.

(F) ASSESSMENT MATTERS

Assessment is integral to teaching and learning as it helps to monitor students' learning processes, ascertain their holistic development, and provide timely intervention and support. Besides common tests and end-of-year examinations, there are various formative assessments to monitor learning and provide feedback. These include quizzes, individual or group assignments, projects, class participation, assignment/file checks.

For certain subjects like History, Geography, D&T, FCE, Sports Science and Art, work done in projects and coursework may replace common tests. The weighting for lower secondary D&T and FCE differs from other subjects as they are taught on a semestral basis.

Students who are absent from any assessments should provide a medical certificate to their subject teachers upon return.

1 Adjustment of prices for school canteen food
